This is due to pressures from her parents about maintaining her grades, to get into colleges and universities they approve, to pursue degrees that they approve as well. While for Malcolm school has not been a top priority since his mom passed away. King and the Dragonflies is about a young boy named King who recently lost his brother and believes that his sibling has returned as a dragonfly. Set in the Louisiana Bayou, it is told first person from King's perspective. Although it's rated for ages 8-12, themes like sexual identity, death, and kidnapping pack a little more emotion into this than you may expect from middle-grade literature. It is the 2020 National Book Award Winner for Young People's Literature. Overall, I enjoyed the story, it was emotionally evocative even for an adult! However, one thing I did not care for was the cover. The lettering was odd and the word dragonflies was separated without a hyphen. Small thing but it detracts from the cover illustration, which is beautiful.

Forget This Ever Happened (ARC) Holiday House, 2020

It's June 1993 and Claire is forced to spend her summer before her senior year taking care of her grandmother (she barely knows) in the small, rundown town of Indianola, Texas. Claire feels all is not as it seems in this gothic-vibed town--but she can't always remember why. Everyone has a habit of forgetting things here. One day a lizard-like creature stalks her from the backyard so the town exterminators are called. The exterminator turns out to be 17-year-old Julie Alvarez. Evidently, these monsters are known to everyone in Indianola. A hundred years ago a peace treaty was hammered out by the Alvarez family which requires the monsters to not hurt humans and stay in the power plant outside of town. Julie immediately has a crush on Claire, but Claire just likes Julie's company. What's strange is how Claire's grandma detests Julie and forbids Claire to see her because she's an Alvarez. Instead, Claire is forced to hang out with Audrey, a neighborhood girl who causes headaches for Claire with strange games. In alternating chapters told by Julie and Claire, their friendship grows which causes conflicting feelings for Claire, yet the two girls investigate the town's history as one way to solve the mystery of the monsters. Students will enjoy this one as it has a bit of everything (atmosphere, action, slow-burn queer romance, science fiction and mystery).

Elen didn't mean to make Owain think she had the ear of the Saints, she was just trying to stay alive. However, since the day she healed him, he has kept her by his side convinced that as long as she is there no harm can come to him. So she travels with the warband that killed her family with no hope of any other life. Until Owain kidnaps the wife and children of a Norman Lord and war is on the horizon. In the early 1100s, Wales was made up of a hodgepodge of kingdoms with roving warbands on the attack. It was a time of kings and warlords, with nary a mention of women in the historical record. From this time comes a novel built around the true story of a woman and her children who were kidnapped by one of the warbands. Historical records shows that she not only got away but also played a crucial part in negotiating the return of her children. Well researched and from a female perspective that we don't often get from that time in history. Fans of historical fiction will enjoy this.

And her widowed father has another nickname for her, and brings out another side. None of these three care-givers can stand eachother. Both women are well-drawn and interesting (one is a 'women's libber'), but all three adults have hidden what they know about Allegra's mother from her. In this book, the family begins to deal with their trauma and grief, and the story is told with beautiful imagery. Set in 1970's Australia.

Haylah Swinton has always dreamed of being a comedian. She stays up way too late watching videos, TV shows, and sketches of all the best comedy acts. Haylah is hindered by her worries about her size. When bullies started calling her pig, she turned the tables on them by embracing the name and now everyone calls her Pig, by her choice. When she finds out that her crush Leo does stand-up comedy, she starts slipping material for his act into his locker. He figures it out and asks for her help writing a sketch for a competition. But helping Leo doesn't help Haylah pursue her own dreams.

Set in England, so there is some British slang. Some swearing. Body dysmorphia issues and fat shaming. Some kissing. There is a strong story line about honesty and standing up for oneself. There are also story lines about family relationships and friendship. The humor is solid. There's a lot going on in here and it ties together pretty well. It fell down in the areas of feminism - calling girls tarts and airheads and also it may not have been the most accurate in how it addressed Haylah's body issues, such as saying that fat is a feeling. The Ice Queen has taken over the land of Erkenwald, and those who she doesn't control, are deep in hiding. Flint is one who is still free of her control. He is on a mission at the Queen's palace when he discovers Eska trapped in a music box, the queen having stolen her memories. Flint helps Eska to escape, starting their adventure to stop the Ice Queen before she controls everything.

A Good Girl's Guide to Murder AGGGTM #1 Delacorte Press, 2020

Everyone in Fairview remembers the tragedy 5 years ago when popular senior Andrea (Andie) Bell disappeared and then days later her boyfriend Sal Singh left a confession note after killing himself. It's August before Pip's senior year and she chooses Andie's disappearance for her Capstone senior project. Pip has doubts about Sal's guilt especially since Andie's body was never found. She quickly gets Sal's older brother on board and he helps her investigate. Pip narrates the story and includes her Capstone research

project log which contains transcripts of her interviews, notes and Persons of Interest list which keeps growing. Pip is too fearless with whom she interviews--including known drug dealers and murder suspects. It turns out that Andi wasn't as nice as she was popular--she actually bullied other students and was seeing an older man. Pip knows she's on the right track when she gets threatening notes that tell her to stop but she continues on--even when her suspects include family members of her best friend. When tragedy strikes, will it finally be enough for Pip to drop the investigation? Students will enjoy this mystery as the tension ratchets up with the twists and turns of Pip's investigation. The racially diverse characters are distinct and interesting and add more depth to this thriller.

Six Angry Girls Feiwel & Friends, 2020

Raina has just been dumped by her boyfriend of five years and is lost as to whether drama is still her passion in life. Millie loves the mock debate team and has devoted her last three years of high school to it, however, when the boys push her out in her last year, she is devastated. The two girls decide that they are going to join forces to create a new mock trial team from six angry (or motivated) girls. Through practicing and getting into character for mock debate, as well as getting their anger out through a kitting group that creates female and male anatomy to send to politicians and judges, these girls discover that they have a great deal to offer their school and themselves. A fun read, told in alternating chapters between Raina and Millie. There is a lot of humor in the knitting club, where there are only two teenagers among politically active older women who create genitalia that they can throw at people or "yarn bomb" with. A fun mix of characters with a wide range of interests, backgrounds, and diversity, this is a good read where the reader may learn a little bit more about trials in the process.

For 17-year-old Ashley Hawkins, the Smoky Mountains near her home are a place of refuge, strength, and--a great place to party where you won't get caught by police. Ashley and her friends have done this before, but when Ashley strays from the party to go potty, she catches her boyfriend having sex with his ex-girlfriend. Totally pissed off (both in anger and in drink), Ashley blindly runs away, crashing through the trees. She's an experienced hiker and knows better, but the anger and alcohol have overtaken her good sense. When Ashley wakes up in the morning, she's more than hung over, she's seriously hurt her foot that now looks like a bloody mess. Thanks to Ashley spending her summers at outdoor camp under the training of older counselor Davey Beet, she knows how to find edible plants, start a fire using her hair, and look for the hidden trails left by deer. BUT...she's seriously hurt and very far away from camp. Ashley knows her friends will think she just left and went home. It's going to be days before anyone looks for her, but her infected foot won't last that long. Fans of Hatchet looking for an edgier female version will love this tale that is NOT for the squeamish. You will cheer for Ashley and marvel at just how resourceful she can be.

In this atmospheric mystery, high school seniors, Noemi, housemate, Jonas and friend Amberlyn navigate their senior year of high school while struggling to make sense of their friend, Link's drowning in the middle of a dry forest. Ruled as a strange accident, the three teens investigate what really happened. Told from alternating points of view, this is not a straight-forward narrative but a meandering wander through relationships and sexuality. A disappearing lake, Noemi's dream journal and a ghost texting claiming to be Link, all contribute a magical realism to this intriguing lyrical story.

The Black Kids (ARC) Simon & Schuster, 2020

It's the 90s, and Ashley is a high school senior growing up in affluent LA and ostensibly a bit of a cheerleader-cum-mean girl. Ashley is waitlisted for her choice college Stanford, and when LaShawn, a smart athlete scholarship kid from the other side of town, shows up for school in the latest Air Jordans, Ashley starts a rumor saying she heard he stole them during the on-going Rodney King race riots. LaShawn has already been accepted to Ashley's choice school Stanford. Meanwhile, she smokes pot with her long-time best friend's boyfriend and they end up having sex. Prom night comes around and truths are told. Ashley has to face her friends and face her own truths especially the fact that she's a Black girl in a very white world. This book is a keen look at race relations, microaggressions, privilege and class. A high-interest, worthy and necessary historical fiction for all high school collections.

In a dystopian world besieged by monsters and ruled by a Golden Dragon, Ren, a human abandoned by her human family, is raised by lynxes and develops the ability to transform into a lynx at will. Their forest has been overtaken and other bad magical creatures have killed the villagers. Lukasz, one of ten Wolf-Brothers who are destined to kill the dragon have all been killed trying. Ren and Lukasz work together and fall in love trying to save their world. This book has twists and turns with characters who are not stereotypical. Nobody is perfect, and nothing is as it seems or typically is. World building is added to by two "un-Naturalists" explaining and commenting on the situation creating scene by scene writing rather than an action-packed narrative. It's thoughtful.

Land of the Cranes Scholastic, 2020

This novel in verse is the story of Betita. She and her parents are undocumented immigrants from Mexico. Her dad is taken by ICE from his job site and deported. When they hear about a park on the border where they might be able to meet him through a fence, they and some of their relatives drive down there. But they miss the last US exit. When trying to re-enter the US, Betita and her pregnant mother are detained and put into a detention camp. The conditions are wretched. Betita tries to hold onto hope by writing picture poems. Although the main character is young, the topic is relevant and Betita's voice is mature. It will hold up in a middle school library as well as elementary. The cover does an excellent job of

portraying an appropriate image for such a deep and sensitive topic that will also help with the appeal for a middle school audience.

As the second book in a series, it serves as a bridge and as such I did not enjoy it as much as the first book. However, it still has intrigue, action, and interesting characters including some new ones that add to the story of Guinevere and Arthur. It ends on quite the cliff hanger, so beware, especially if you won't be able to read book 3 for a while. CW: Some violence/fighting but not bloody or gory, references to sex but all couched in terms of "the marital act", etc, magic use throughout.
