Then Dante decides to try out for Tony's AAU basketball team and is crushed to not make the team. However, the coach persuades Dante to be the team's statistician and acknowledge his nerdy side. The story is divided into four quarters and is full of riveting action-packed basketball scenes. Give this book a try if you want a gripping realistic story about family, brotherhood, basketball, injustice, poverty, and trauma—all told through the eyes of a funny, sad, frustrated black teen.

In *Spells for Lost Things* by Jenna Evans Welch (author of *Love and Gelato*), two teens are begrudgingly dragged to Salem, Massachusetts, but end up finding just what they need in each other and in this town that holds family secrets for both of them. Willow, feeling isolated and distant from her work-obsessed mother, is forced to travel to Salem after the passing of her mom's twin sister, Sage, who Willow never even knew existed (and who may or may not be a WITCH!). Mason, who is on a quest to find his estranged mother who struggles with drug addiction, reluctantly moves to a new foster home in Salem to live under the care of his mother's childhood friend. Fate brings Willow and Mason together, igniting an instant connection as they try to solve an ancient family curse. Along the way, they are aided by a trio of eccentric great-aunts who all identify as witches! While the romance between Willow and Mason is definitely a focus (and so darn sweet), this story also tackles some heavier issues, especially complex and challenging relationships within families, which many kids will be able to relate to. Watch out or you just might fall under the "spell" of this story of love, belonging, and finding solace in unexpected places!
