Your Blood, My Bones (ARC) Orion, 2024

After the death of her cult leader father, Wyatt returns to her family farm with the intention of burning the place down. However, when she returns, she finds more of a mess than she expected including the twist that her childhood friend and first crush, Peter, is actually a semi-immortal being who has been ritually killed at the hands of the cult over and over for centuries. In order for him to be free, Wyatt's blood line must end. In order for Wyatt to stop the encroaching evil forces her father has been holding back, Peter must continue to die. The pair must navigate the complications in their relationship, mourning loss, and saving the world while continuing to fight the darkness looming closer and closer. A true horror title with a satisfying friends to enemies to lovers romance subplot.

The Blood Years Balzer + Bray, 2023

Based on her grandmother's experiences, Arnold tells the story of one family's life in Czernowitz, a city in present day Ukraine, over the course of World War II. Since their father left when she was 6, Rieke, her older sister Astra, and their mother have lived with her grandfather, a watchmaker and devout Jew. When the book opens in 1939, Czernowitz has been under Romanian rule for twenty years, Germany has invaded Poland, war has been declared. Jews have already lost status as citizens. The sense of fear and of being trapped between enemies pervades the book as Rieke deals with both the frightening changes of political occupation and her own family drama. As the years pass, neighbors move away or are killed, the family is rounded up and kept within a ghetto - where Rieke contracts tuberculosis - then released to return to their apartment. Rieke suffers incredible loss, starvation, and violence (including sexual violence), but, incredibly, survives. The geography of "The Blood Years" sets it apart from other holocaust stories, and the writing is exceptionally compelling. The book includes helpful contextual sections including a brief history of Czernowitz, author's note, reading list, and photos. Highly recommended.

The Curse of the Eelgrass Bog Razorbill, 2024

Twelve-year-old Kess Pedrock is trying to keep her family's Unnatural History Museum together while she waits for her parents to return from a research expedition. Her 15-year-old brother Oliver is supposed to be in charge but he isn't helping her efforts much—he just tells her to stay away from the Eelgrass Bog near their home. Kess' only friend isn't handy at helping either since he doesn't have hands—or body! He's a talking head from the museum that Kess carries around in a jar for company. How long her parents have been gone is a bit fuzzy in Kess' mind. Facts seem to slip in and out of her brain while the pull to visit the Eelgras Bog is hard to resist, despite her brother's warnings. Then Lilou Starling

shows up at the museum asking for help to break a curse—her grandfather's last request to her before he died. Lilou is the first girl her age Kess has encountered in, well, she can't remember how long. Just who is cursed and the surprising connection between the two girls may be the key to helping Kess and her brother to change their situation for the better. If they can survive in the Eelgrass Bog that is. A few British-isms may confuse US readers, but this light horror mystery will appeal to fans of Ellen Oh's Spirit Hunters series or Heidi Lang's Whispering Pines series. Recommended grades 5-8.

When rival lab workers Ver and Aryl are accused of murdering the supervisor, the two of them must team up to solve his murder so they won't be sent to a penal moon for a crime they didn't commit. Which means the two of them will have to figure out how to trust one another and find that they may have more in common than they thought. But the more the two girls dig into things, the more secrets they find. Secrets that powerful people would prefer not be found. Can they clear their names before time runs out? This rivals to lovers sci-fi murder mystery is a fun fast read. Great for both sci-fi fans and mystery lovers. Recommended for 7th grade and up. Disability and chronic illness representation. Immigrant experience representation. Queer romance.

Plan A Labyrinth Road, 2023

Ivy finds herself with a public, unwanted pregnancy while living in Texas. Bad combination. Oh, and it's not her boyfriend's baby. We find out more about that as we go. However, she has an understanding mom, a grandmother in Oregon prepared to make an abortion appointment, and a boyfriend willing to drive her. Not only drive her there, but make an adventure out of it. Instead of taking the highways, they will see the "world": Paris, Texas; Moscow, Kansas; Genoa, Colorado; Manila, Utah and so on. They will stay with family friends along the way and that is where the heart of the story is. Because they all know that Ivy is on her way to get an abortion, they feel free to reveal their own abortion stories. The author uses these moments to insert facts, figures, historic information, and laws about pregnancy, abortion, and women's rights to make decisions about their own bodies. It was interesting but some might find it heavy-handed. Loved the characters, especially her younger brother, a gay chef living in Texas who is absolutely there for his mom and sister. One caveat about the book: I don't totally understand why she didn't make a bigger deal about the boy who did get her pregnant. Though there was no "penetration" it was still an assault on her body. I get that she just wanted to forget about it, but couldn't because of the pregnancy. But why didn't her mom pursue the issue? Recommended for MS & HS. (One sex scene that could be overlooked by unaware readers.)

Except... a town terrorized by bandits decides to hire warriors to defend them from the next attack, and 7 of the kindling answer their call, banding together for one final heroic battle. This is a novel in three parts: assembling the team, training the townspeople in self-defense, and THE BATTLE. The first 2/3 of the book are character-driven while the finale is a edge-of-your seat climax. An Asian-inflected reimagining of The Seven Samurai and The Magnificent Seven. Several on-page lesbian sex scenes. The 7 POV characters are female, nonbinary, lesbian, and/or ace/aro.

She also wonders how her super-religious, stick-thin-with-no-curves and super-nerdy friend, Leti, has managed to find a boyfriend (and get pregnant) while Belén remains a virgin (code for unwanted). To deal with her sense of inadequacy, Belén makes some questionable life choices, metaphorically running from her problems. Although the reader recognizes that Belén is struggling with mental illness, Belén doesn't have the awareness or language to explain what's happening, but with the support of her friends and finally her family, Belén begins to craft a plan for her life after high school. Most characters are Latinx. The author deftly addresses Brown/Black racism, female sexuality, and body shaming. Descriptive on-page-sex (and childbirth).

Meanwhile the west coast is heading towards a pandemic shutdown. His neighbors, the Whitaker's children have been close friends of Dre's for a long time and he and the Whitaker kids are mystified about where their sibling Eric went after Dre's arrest. If Dre can find Eric, then he can clear his name of the robberies he was falsely accused of and finally be free. Until then his only freedom comes from when he can swim to the bottom of the pool where he works, which makes his ankle monitor invisible and that is the only time he feels free, thus the title of the book. This story captures all the layers of injustice that happened in 2020, from the

astronomical deaths of BIPOC people from COVID to the murder of George Floyd. The author also provides thought provoking insight which includes the irony of all the white people who pushed out black families in his gentrified neighborhood also display Black Lives Matter flags. The writing gave me a glimpse of the tragic deaths during COVID, especially when someone dies and because of the lockdown they couldn't be there to say goodbye or even have a funeral. The author also had me guessing about what happened to Eric right up to the last pages.

Sona lives in Devia, a colonized land where music, the source of her people's magic, has been forbidden by the Malechians. The Malechians require the locals to mine precious gems, regardless of the cost to the miners and their communities, all to build the wealth of the conquerors. All of this sounds very basic, black and white, good and bad. However, LaRocca takes this foundation and complicates it for her readers. Sona has grown up as the daughter of a Malechian farmer, secure because she is not Devian, with gold-tipped ears. The story really starts when Sona finds out that her whole life is a lie, her father is actually her uncle, and her parents were Malechian and Devian, a marriage that is forbidden. At the same time, Sona rescues a wolf cub, one of the Great Beasts of Devia, who protect the people and the place. This cub is being tracked by a Malechian hunter, determined to remove the beasts as no more than Devian superstition giving hope to those who should be hopeless. Sona and Raag must save the wolf cub and Raag's grandmother, while evading the Hunter, and find that their quest might be the one prophesied to save Devia. If only Sona and Raag can get along and work together. This book starts off seeming very straightforward but becomes so thoughtful and complex, describing the ways that identity, communities, and cultures mix even in times of colonization and power imbalance. Sona's worldview is very simple when we meet her, and it is through her experiences and the people she meets, who are all more than one-dimensional, that our understanding of Devia comes into focus. Folkstories and songs add depth to Devian culture, and we see that there is no blood quantum required to be Devian. Highly recommended for middle school. I loved this. This is my top Evergreen pick from my stack this time.

This book tells the final part of a trilogy set in the country of Castallan, a Spanish-inspired monarchy. The book starts with the return of Sombra, the dark god who has been trying to return from his exile and to spread his darkness across the land, because he wants the attention of the other gods. Our main characters, Alfie and Finn, have to journey around the world to collect the relics of Sombra's body to prevent him from being able to fully return. Alfie and Finn are struggling under the weight of a well-known prophecy that says they will be the ones to defeat Sombra, as well as the aftermath of what they thought was a single romantic night together in the previous book. In the meantime, Lucian and James must face their homeland, changed under Sombra's dark influence so that plants wither and people's worst selves are brought to the front. We get to peek in with Sombra through Dez, Alfie's older brother whose body has been possessed by Sombra. The writing is clear, the story has high stakes and vibrant characters. However, a lot of the weight of the book and character growth seems to come from the previous books in the trilogy. Switching POVs for characters I wasn't attached to was rough, because the work of getting me to care for them had been (presumably) laid down earlier. I liked this book, but didn't love it. I might go back and try to read the first book and see if I want to make time for the whole series. I would recommend this for middle school and high school students, and for fantasy readers looking for a fantasy trilogy that isn't set in medieval England.

Big Mother isn't too happy with her husband's second family (even changing Thu'o'ng's name to Bé), and her mother eventually leaves Bé to find a job to get them both out of that house. However, Big Mother gets so frustrated with Bé that she sells her to soldiers. Mèo is a cat that Bé found at her father's house and snuck him away when she got sold. This is a harrowing story that the author had pulled from stories her relatives told her (the author's note at the end explains where Bé's story comes from). It does have a happy ending, though (Bé escapes from the soldiers and gets a new family).

The waiting and wondering is not easy for Lydia who joins a secret school without her mother's permission, taking piano lessons and sneaking food into the concentration camps. She wants to do more, but her brother won't let her join the underground. After witnessing an uprising in the concentration camp, she demands to be part of the underground organization and eventually gets her wish. This is not my favorite of Jennifer Nielsen's books, because of the long, hopeless beginning, but that is necessary to paint an accurate picture of Poland at this time and to show Lydia's desire to do more and more and more to help.

Excellent book that addresses self-harm, family alcoholism, bullying, rape, and victim-blaming with honesty and intensity.

Her dad, however, has different goals for Mina that look more traditionally stable and involve things like SAT Prep Courses and the Ivy League. To escape her reality, Mina dives headfirst into creating a web comic. Taking feedback from her two best friends, Mina tries to make her web comic more exciting than previous results adding students with special powers and an evil billionaire intent on stealing their powers for himself to her high school story. Will Mina save her web comic? Will she return to the real world? Will there be a love triangle despite her insistence of no love triangles? While the target audience for this book may be high school students, middle school students would also be able to access this truly fun read with ease.

Ariana Ruiz has autism and doesn't speak often, making her feel invisible and friendless at her high school. When cute, popular Luis Ortega singles her out, she is flattered by the attention—until he rapes her at a party and then dismissively tells others about it. Angry and isolated, Ari finds herself the target of rumors, bullying, and even further sexual harassment. Then she finds a note in her locker that simply says, "Me too," leading to a gathering of other victims of Luis Ortega. Together these victims come up with a plan to expose Luis and stop him from hurting others, and along the way their shared trauma blossoms into friendships and even romance. This is a story for anyone who has wished an abuser had been held accountable. A story where adults are imperfect but supportive when

it matters. A story where people ask for consent and respect boundaries. You'll root for this disparate group as they navigate an explosive issue and everyday high school drama. The Luis Ortega Survival Club is weirdly breezy at times considering the difficult subject matter and I recommend it for high schoolers with some reservations. Reyes opens her novel with a note to readers to consider their emotional well-being before reading. I would advise any librarian recommending the book to a student to do the same.

Dead Girls Don't Say Sorry Alfred A. Knopf, 2024

In chapters that alternate from BEFORE to AFTER, Nora tells the story of her toxic friendship with Julia, a manipulative queen bee. We learn early on that Julia died and Nora feels responsible, and Ritany drops breadcrumbs about this mystery for most of the book. Also from the start, we get hints that Julia is lying and controlling her friends. Nora lives in denial, long past the point when someone could reasonably give Julia the benefit of the doubt. Meanwhile, Nora is considering journalism school, her attraction to Nate, and her friendship with Dillon. It's an emotional rollercoaster as Nora's feelings vacillate between fear and happiness, betrayal and loyalty, trust and incredulity. This is the book's strength: it examines the mixture of naiveté and conflicted emotions that come when we begin to realize that someone in our lives is no good for us.

This YA fantasy is set in a world inspired by pre-revolution France, where scarecrows are enchanted to come to life to defend the people from the restless dead. Lady Charlotte Sand is an expert at settling the dead, distraught wraiths that require being met with compassion and kindness. Through several wild turns, she finds herself partnered with her family's guardian scarecrow, come to life to join her as members of the Order of Guardians who protect the kingdom. Unfortunately, the young prince and the regent just disbanded the Order and are collecting the hearts of all the guardians to keep them from coming to life ever again. Charlotte finds herself pitted directly against Luc de Montaigne, Captain of the Cardinal's Guard, who has been tasked with bringing her and the guardians to heel. They find that their attraction and deep past make them really think through their choices. The world-building is detailed and the magic system revolves around spirits, bones, and plants, which gives it a unique and haunting atmosphere. The romance is slow-burn though at times, it can feel forced due to their conflicting loyalties, especially given Charlotte's quest for revenge against the man who caused her brother's death. Rodgers' storytelling is praised for its vivid descriptions, particularly in scenes involving Charlotte's power and the eerie interactions with spirits. However, some readers found the pacing slow at times, especially in regards to character development and romantic tension. This book is best suited for readers who enjoy dark fantasy worlds, morally complex characters, and narratives steeped in emotional conflict. It sets up the next installment of the duology well, leaving readers eager for more of Charlotte and Luc's journey. I really enjoyed this book

and recommend it for your fantasy readers. I would recommend it for High School and older Middle School students, if you have strong feminist fantasy readers.

Léon Delafosse is a talented young pianist searching for a patron in 1890s Paris when he crosses paths with Marcel Proust, who takes him under his wing. "We're both weird outsider fairy creatures, you and me," Marcel tells him early on. Through Marcel, Léon meets the "Oscar Wilde of France," Count Robert de Montesquiou-Fézensac, who offers him his patronage. Robert enjoys Léon's naivety and the possibilities of his talent and Léon is starry-eyed over Robert's extravagance and seeming openness about his sexuality. This openness has its limits, however, and an act of betrayal ultimately turns Léon back to his historical obscurity. Léon Delafosse was a real pianist, immortalized by John Singer Sargent in a portrait that both inspired the book and takes place within it. Schrefer explains his inspirations in an interesting author's note. While a fun element, knowledge of the historical and literary connections aren't necessary to enjoy "Charming Young Man," which works wonderfully simply as a historical coming-of-age story of a young gay man.

Time is running short; if Key is still alive, he's very old, and Winna's mom, who's been in the hospital, doesn't seem to be getting better. Winna enlists her cousin to help solve the mystery, but when he puts on the glasses and speculates "what if they don't work..." things get a lot more complicated. Recommended for all ages.

Winna finds that she is able to see a family ghost, who connects her to the family's past and future, and sets Winna on a journey to break a family curse that might be killing her own mother. *Speculation* explores generational trauma and the ways in which the past continues to influence the present. The novel delves into difficult topics, such as loss, racism, and family secrets, but does so sensitively which makes it accessible to a middle-grade audience. Shawl's writing is clear and evocative, with a narrative style that balances the fantastical elements of the story with the grounded reality of Winna's life. Recommended for middle school. Is slight enough not to intimidate kids who are intimidated by chonky books. The action and drama are relatively low, though it is life and death for Winna's mom, the tension feels like a historical fiction, rather than an actionadventure book. A sweet (ha) and poignant slice-of-life with very well-handled explorations of mental health and relationships. Kal is his high school's "candy guy," selling candygrams and regular sugar fixes to his classmates in order to make money. His parents are marriage therapists who host a popular relationship advice podcast, but he feels like he's watching them drift apart in front of his eyes, so Kal is saving up to take them on what he hopes will be a marriage-saving vacation, a recreation of a cherished family trip to Hawaii. After he ends up having an accidental chat with his crush in which he gives her some advice about her relationship... and she refers a friend... he finds that he's all of a sudden gone from the Candy Guy to the Therapy Guy. And at \$10 per 7 minutes, that's going to get him to his goal much quicker, but with much more potential for disaster. I was pleased that we ended up exploring not only discussions of mental health but the ethics of giving relationship advice to your crush, the complexities of relationships, and the idea that even when you're right and the advice you give is solid, you're not the one who gets to make the choice. I also appreciated seeing the perspectives Kal shared as a Black student at a mostly-white school; some excellent friend dynamics including hurting your friends and doing the repair work; and a plot hurdle involving a student government girl trying to sabotage Kal's business as revenge for his effect on student government candy sales. A few mentions of sex but overall fine for middle school, but probably more interesting to high schoolers.

After surviving a plague that killed the rest of her family, Lia was raised in a convent dedicated to serving one of the old gods. Taught that it was her destiny to walk into the deadly briar that has surrounded an old palace for hundreds of years, kill the sorcerer who raised the briar, and wake the old gods and royal family so they can once again touch her world, make saints, and work miracles, Lia has prepared her whole life to do just that. But when she does, she finds that she cannot retire to the convent as she believed, but must marry into the newly revived royal family and become a saint herself. Worse, the very act she committed in order to awaken the gods causes the goddess she served to reject her. Instead of becoming a saint to Nin-Anna, the goddess of spring and healing, she instead is chosen by Mor-Iva, the knife of the gods, and her hands are transformed into charred black claws. Also, she is being haunted by Ruven, the hot sorcerer she killed, and not figuratively. This book has very dense world-building that is sometimes hard to follow and can get pretty grotesque, but Hodge uses it to explore themes of faith and devotion. The inevitable romance that springs between the main character and the man she murdered is quite different than others we see in YA fantasy because neither sacrifices their beliefs even

when it means the other's death. But the consequence is the reader never feeling wholly invested in the relationship. Recommended for readers interested in religious questions in a fantasy setting.

The Coldest Winter I Ever Spent Carolrhoda Lab, 2023

"The Coldest Winter I Ever Spent" opens with the main character, Del, on the phone as a volunteer with a suicide prevention hotline navigating what is ultimately a successful intervention. Del is eighteen, getting treatment for anxiety and depression, sober, and a survivor of a suicide attempt herself. She lives in San Francisco with her Aunt Fran, an art gallerist, and is pursing a romantic relationship with an old friend and planning on enrolling in college. But she is thrown off balance when Fran confesses that she has been diagnosed with terminal cancer and further asks Del to help her end her life. Del, whose identity has become tied to suicide prevention, is absolutely certain at first that this is the wrong choice. But as the summer passes and she becomes the caregiver of her increasingly ill aunt, the fact of her death cannot go away. Del struggles throughout the novel, at one point falling off the wagon, but ultimately the book is hopeful, a story that shows how programs like hotlines and AA and hospice help people and save lives. Readers should be prepared for the slow death of Aunt Fran, but the book treats her passing with compassion and care.

Almost immediatley after starting, she is a witness to and victim of racism and hate crimes. She, with the few other Black students, decide to take a stand against the violence. There is one guy who seems to be running the show and she is determined to call him out, but nothing seems to go her way. She meets a boy along the way but is struggling because she has to decide what the wants to prioritize. I liked that there was a lot of AAVE (African-American Vernacular English) and code-switching in this book, it made it more realistic ... but most of the characters felt one-sided, and the ending was tied up WAY too neatly. Cherkas and Hancock wrote the original Silent Invasion comic books in the late 1980s, this is a continuation volume published in 2021. The series follows a journalist, and later his brother, investigating possible UFO abductions that may somehow involve Communists. Or something. It's all very murky. The art is a sort of super-stylized 1980s version of Gasoline Alley. The book's blurbs are enraptured with how thought-provoking and of the moment it is, but it struck me as the sort of generic paranoia/conspiracy fiction that has remained unchanged for generations, often merely cribbing interesting threads from actual paranoia and conspiracy writings without any of its original meaning or context. (And despite taking place in the 1970s, there is a thinly disguised Donald Trump figure at his current age. Confusing and to no apparent purpose.) The book does not resolve any of the threads raised in the storyline, which seems to be the way of the generic paranoia/conspiracy genre. Another volume of the series is listed at the end of the book, but seems not to have been published, though the volume names are confusing as the issues collected and titles given to the compilations seem to have varied over the series' lifetime. Would it have wrapped everything up? If The X-Files is any guide, no. Does not stand alone as a book.

The book also spotlights women who worked during the Gold Rush. While brief, this book can open readers eyes to untold history and prompt them to learn more. Eddie grows up with a love of sports and the outdoors and his disrupted family. Weed: Cannabis Culture in the Americas Zest Books, 2023

The author is a journalist with an interest in alternative culture that has led her to podcast on "psychoactive substances in times of prohibition" in her adopted hometown, Mexico City. The book looks at cannabis through interviews centered around three themes. It has a casual, conversational style that does not lend itself to be a handy research resource. The information is not US-centered: the interviews are with people all over the Americas which gives the book a more global perspective. Part 1 explores "Cannabis and Our Bodies" and

includes a nurse, a patient, and an athlete. The underlying message is to go beyond "Just Say No" to get to "harm reduction", or informed use as well as noting the lack of real evidence of effects due to worldwide prohibition. Part 2 is "Canna Culture" where we learn that hemp is an amazing building material, that hemp fabric is difficult to produce because it is so sharp, and that Rastafari villages are promoting a cannabis experience for tourists on Jamaica island. The last part, "The Fight for Drug War Justice", explores the injustice prohibition brings on blacks, women, and the poor in the Americas. Interviews range from mothers fighting to access medical marijuana for their children, to brave protesters standing up to their governments, to the surprising fact that Uruguay was the first country to legalize the growth and sales of cannabis. This book covers the #MeToo movement from a historic perspective, putting it into context and describing the behaviors and responses for young people I think there's a lot of value in having books that cover recent history—a lot of kids will have heard of #MeToo, but they do not have a broad encompassing picture of what the movement was and how it related to real people. I really liked this book from that perspective. I will say that the conversations about consent and are almost exclusively described with hetero language, of assault on women and girls by men and boys. While relevant to the overall #MeToo conversation, that lone focus suggests to me that you should look to pair this with other books that bring broader understandings of the many ways gender and sexuality can interact around consent and assault. Content-wise, I'd suggest it for mature middle school and for high school, though if your school community is sensitive to topics around sexuality, consent, and recent political movements, it might be a better fit solely for high school. Recommended for high school and for broad middle school collections.
